## From the Pastor's Desk

Monday of Lent 3

February 25, 2008

*Justified by Grace through Faith*

Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

During Lent this year, we have been hearing readings from Romans in our non-Gospel, New Testament reading. These readings (Romans 5:12-19; 4:1-5, 13-17; 5:1-11) have been focused primarily on our understanding of justification.

It would be no exaggeration to say that Paul was exceedingly interested in the idea of justification. But what exactly does it mean? And why are we focusing on it in Lent? Isn't Lent supposed to be about guilt and feeling bad for our wretched sinful lives? Or meditating on the gory, bloody passion of Jesus?

For Lutherans, justification has been called the "article by which the church stands or falls." Luther and the other reformers saw the doctrine of justification as the primary lens through which we read Scripture. Paul emphasizes justification in his epistles, but it is the African theologian Augustine in the 4<sup>th</sup> century who stakes out the primary understanding of justification for the western Church. Luther and his fellow reformers boldly proclaim this doctrine as a means to call the church back to its central tenet, and to show that they were not doing or creating something new. Two Lutheran scholars summarize Augustine's teaching as follows.

Augustine affirmed... that after the fall all human beings are under the impact of original sin, turned in on themselves in egoistic self-realization and turned away from God, so that their apparent freedom becomes in fact unfreedom to do what is essentially good. By their own efforts they cannot turn to God. Rather, from the outside, God's grace in Jesus Christ effects a new orientation in believers, transforms their will, and enables them not only to do what is good but also to desire what is good. This grace is an unconditional free gift that makes people righteous before God so that they are justified before God.<sup>1</sup>

In justification we are reoriented, so that the breach of sin, might be healed. Justification is the way that God brings peace to our relationship. But it is only in Christ that justification finds meaning. In Jesus' death and resurrection, we are able to find our justification for living, i.e. our true meaning in life. We are reminded the Crucified one lives for us! Jesus' death is behind him and therefore his love can be stopped by nothing.

Because of what Christ has done and continues to do for us, let us persevere in our Lenten disciplines, seeking through grace to live as those who are justified, made righteous.

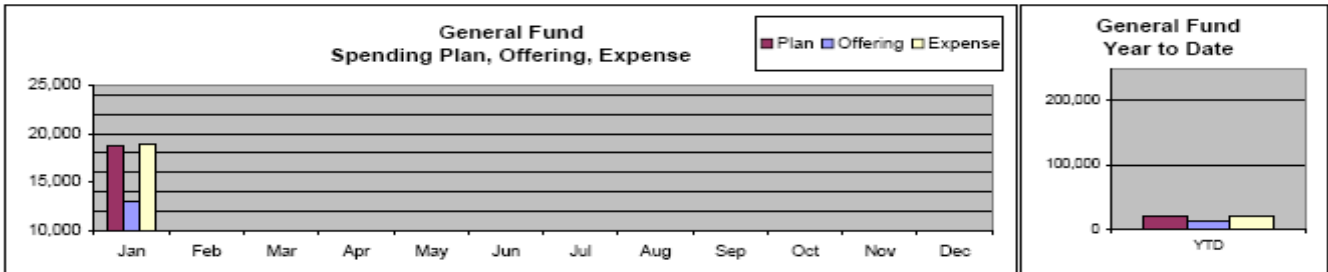

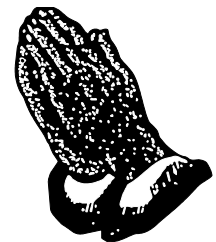

## The Green Corner

Lutherans may be interested to learn that the executive director of Earth Ministry, an ecumenical Christian organization that engages people of faith in environmental stewardship and the Rev. Stephen Grumm, minister of church and community of Our Redeemer's Lutheran Church in Ballard, WA, have co-authored a column in the Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

They both agree that it is time to move the climate debate into the solution area, and that there is a growing religious concern that climate change is one of the largest—if not the largest—moral issue of our time. People of faith are called to care for all creation. Global warming puts human health and the health of all the rest of Earth's creatures at risk. There are already more environmental refugees than political refugees in the world, and from a moral and ethical perspective, it is simply unacceptable to allow global warming to continue unchecked. The Christian community is organizing to combat it. More than 4,000 churches have screened "An Inconvenient Truth" and discussion groups are pressing congressional representatives. Their article, titled "Can you hear the faith-based call to clean up the environment?" ends with the trust that our Creator is acting not only through them, but also countless others, and God will uplift and sustain them in their mission.

### West Virginia Environmental Council's Green Legislative Update (Feb/08)

**Wilderness**—Congressman Nick Rahall is going to introduce "Wild Monongahela Act." He's billing the legislation as "A National Legacy for West Virginia's Special Places." This proposal would expand or add seven wilderness areas in the Mon, the first additions in WV in nearly 25 years. Rahall is chair of the House Natural Resources, Committee which controls public lands legislation. Under federal law, wilderness areas are those "where the earth and its community of life are untrammled by man, where man himself is a visitor who does not remain." Wilderness Act prohibits commercial activities, motorized access and roads, structures and facilities. Hiking is allowed, but logging is prohibited. Rahall's plan calls for expansion of 3 existing areas—Cranberry, Dolly Sods, Dry Fork. Also 4 new areas—Big Draft, Cheat Mountain, Roaring Plans West, Spice Run. "These areas that we are proposing to conserve in their natural state represent a significant national resource," said Rahall. "But more importantly to us, they constitute a fundamental right of West Virginians to retain a vital link to our heritage, and to know that, forever more, these lands will remain in their natural state as our Creator forged them."

**Renewable Portfolio Standard**—House Bill 4083, introduced by Delegate Barbara Fleischauer (Monongalia County) would establish a RPS for WV. It specifies that by 2020, 15% of WV electricity must come from renewable sources. Senate Bill 299, introduced by Jon Hunter (Monongalia County) is similar but specifies 20% renewable. Renewable energy technologies are considered important sources for creating new direct jobs. According to CNN, 250,000 jobs have been created in renewables in Germany. Our neighbor Pennsylvania is about to get the largest solar photovoltaic plant east of the Mississippi financed and built by a German solar company EPURON.
