

Embracing The Counter-Cultural: Fasting

Dear St. Paul,

As we embark on the sacred journey of Lent, we find ourselves in a season of reflection, repentance, and renewal. It is a time when we intentionally draw closer to God, seeking a deeper connection through prayer, confession, acts of charity, and yes, possibly even fasting.

Lenten fasting, when approached with sincerity and humility, becomes a transformative practice. It is not about drawing attention to our sacrifice but about redirecting our focus to God. By abstaining from certain comforts or indulgences, we create space for spiritual growth, deepening our awareness of dependence on God and cultivating a spirit of gratitude. In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus reminds us, "When you fast, do not look somber as the hypocrites do, for they disfigure their faces to

show others they are fasting. Truly I tell you, they have their reward. But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, so that it will not be obvious to others that you are fasting, but only to your Father, who is unseen; and your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you" (Matthew 6:16-18, NIV).

In our culture where the constant pursuit of pleasure and comfort often takes precedence, Lenten fasting challenges us to confront the cultural norms that prioritize self-indulgence. It is a deliberate choice to swim against the current, recognizing that true fulfillment comes not from the accumulation of material comforts but from a relationship with the One who satisfies the deepest longings of our hearts.

As we engage in fasting during Lent, let us be mindful of the Apostle Paul's words: "Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will" (Romans 12:2, NIV). Lent provides us with a unique opportunity to break free from conformity, renew our minds, and align ourselves with God's transformative plan.

May this Lenten season be a time of profound spiritual growth and renewal for each of us. Together, as a community committed to countercultural practices rooted in Christ, let us encourage one another on this journey of faith.




