The Church's Great Recession

I'm not an economist by any means, so I likely don't know the entirety of the events or fullness of terms I'm about to offer – but that's never stopped me before. If you paid any attention to what was happening in the late aughts you picked up a few things. Terms like too-big-to-fail, subprime, housing bubble, mortgage-backed securities, stress test, and of course: Great Recession. As a layman's refresher the Great Recession (not a Biblical event - as one of our youth members supposed last year) was a series of dominos that fell causing a number of financial and commercial enterprises to fail or need (one more phrase) a bailout to survive. Some of which seemed implausible if not impossible...but we haven't seen a new Pontiac on the road since.

While the great recession was difficult for church cheque-books, it didn't really affect the substance or way of church itself. Ironically, the Church has been a beacon and presence whose role has typically been increased during times of hardship. Through wars, economic disasters, natural disasters the Church has been there to do what the church does and, in those moments, many churches even thrived.

Until sometime in late 2019 when a SARS virus started to journey around the world and churches faced a challenge they had never faced before. In good times and bad, the Church had been the Church. None of the previous catastrophes the church had endured had prepared it for this. And much like the commercial enterprises of the late aughts, not everyone is going to make it – and it's got nothing to do with money.



But lamentations are raised from my colleagues and institutional studies alike. Many church leaders assumed they would bounce back as they were, yet as we round the corner into a new year, many churches are coming to terms with the bleak realization that their diminishment during the pandemic hasn't receded. Some, an increasing some, of our fellow workers in Christ have discerned that their time together has drawn to a close and are closing down.

Its one thing for a for a church to be financially poorer than it once was but, as we found out during the first Great Recession, that doesn't mean the Gospel work

is halted. It's another thing for the church to lose its greatest asset: people. That changes everything. I'm happy to say that St. Paul seems blessed to be bouncing back or maybe at least into a new normal...time will tell. Our worship attendance was up 34% over the last year from the previous. God is still calling us to continue here as Church together.

On January 22nd (the day of our annual meeting) worship will focus on stewardship. For some that word sounds like a churchy way to say "money," but I think we've learned as a Church just how holistic stewardship is and needs to be for Church to thrive. Stewardship is about giving back, to God and to the work of the Church, those things that come from God. Yes, sometimes this means money but just as importantly it's about those other parts of us we have to offer: our hands for altar guild, our voices to teach Sunday School, time to prepare a Circle of Friends meal, our hearts open and our spirits raised together in worship.

The churches closing won't get to do these things together anymore. But thanks be to God and by God's grace, we here have been given the opportunity to survive the Church's Great Recession. Let us be great stewards of this gift.

You can also sign up on the Kroger app. Click on the menu (three parallel lines in upper right corner), click on "Rewards," and then click on "Community Rewards".


