



In sha'Allah, In Gethsemane

You may have heard the phrase "in sha'Allah." I was reminded of it by a member during our Sunday morning Bible study on Matthew. It's an Arabic phrase which translates as, "if God has willed" or "God willing." You may hear or say "God willing" every now and again as a western Christian, but it tends to be more of an occasional utterance for us. Not so for Muslims worldwide or anyone from predominantly Muslim countries. Exp. Q: "Can we meet for dinner at 6?" A: "Yes, in sha'Allah." It's ubiquitous and usually sincere -- although comically most will say growing up their parents used it at some point to deflect. Exp. Q: "Can we go to the toy store?" A: "In sha'Allah, we'll see." - Translation: "No, not unless God makes me." There is a story from the life of Islam's prophet, Muhammed; a group of people came to him asking a question. He said he would ask God for the answer and respond tomorrow. The men returned, he had no answer as he promised. In the account, it took 15 days for the answer to be made known to him. The take away: we work on God's schedule and not the other way around.

In our Bible study, the words of Jesus in Matthew's Gospel elicited a similar revelation in the form of a question: what do we, as followers of Jesus, make of God's will? Much ink has been spilled by theologians over this question. Some say God controls everything by way of everything and that nothing happens that God does not direct or intend. This view can be a comfort or a curse depending on what is happening. Conversely, others see a God who permits a great deal of choice and happenings outside what we might call God's direct control. This view too can be a comfort or a curse depending on what is happening. Often this is more a question on the topic of God's sovereignty than it is on what might be classified God's will...but let's not get too deep into the weeds on this right now.

In Matthew's Gospel, the lessons Jesus offers through his teaching and life seem to relate, less to answering these questions, as they do to trusting the one who is more powerful than we are with the process and the results. Jesus seems to pick up and pass on the lesson of Job. After Job finally reaches a 'breaking point' God explains to Job that he does not need to understand why everything happens, he should really just accept it. God is bigger than Job - God is God and Job is not. As a mere mortal, "Can you bind the chains of the Pleiades? Can you loosen Orion's belt?!" (Jb 38.31), doesn't always satisfy as an answer, at least not when you're the one covered with sores. But I suppose greater truths aren't dependent on my liking what they are anyway.

Even though Jesus doesn't offer a deep theological answer (perhaps a satisfactory one does not exist?), he does manage to offer a taught and exercised disposition to the question that is ultimately more beneficial. In his Sermon on the Mount, Jesus teaches the disciples that trusting God's will saves from succumbing to fear. Consider the birds of the air and the grass, neither worry about their clothes or food day to day – trust that God will provide for you as God does for God's creation. Knowing that he and his followers will face persecution he teaches them that, even when they face a time of trial or death itself, take heart - God is still in control. "Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father." (Mt. 10.29) And, when

pressed to practice as he preaches, we find Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane praying this, "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet not what I want but what you want...if this cannot pass unless I drink it, your will be done." (Mt. 26) All-in-all it's just a longer way of saying and living *in sha'Allah*. **And** ultimately, recognizing the inevitable *in sha'Allah*ness of everything is a matter of trust and trust is a matter of faith – and faith ain't always easy.




